WILDFLOWER PLANTING (& Seed Balls)

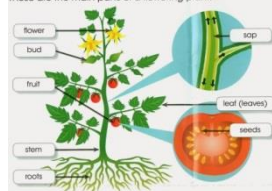
Saturday, September 29, 10:30-11:30 a.m.
